The feast of the Epiphany, which was kept in the East and in certain Western Churches before being observed in Rome, seems to have been originally a feast of the nativity; January 6, for those churches where it was kept, was the equivalent of Christmas (December 25) in the Roman Church. The feast was introduced at Rome in the second half of the sixth century and became the complement and, so to say, the crown of the Christmas festival.

Epiphany means manifestation. What the Church celebrates today is the manifestation of our Lord to the whole world; after being made known to the shepherds of Bethlehem He is revealed to the Magi who have come from the East to adore Him. Christian tradition has ever seen in the Magi the first fruits of the Gentiles; they lead in their wake all the peoples of the earth, and thus the Epiphany is an affirmation of universal salvation. St. Leo brings out this point admirably in a sermon, read at Matins, in which he shows in the adoration of the Magi the beginnings of Christian faith, the time when the great mass of the heathen sets off to follow the star which summons it to seek its Saviour.

That is the meaning, too, of the wonderful prophecy from Isaias which the liturgy appoints to be read in the first nocturn at Matins and at the Epistle of the Mass. This same thought of universal redemption the Church returns to as she sings, in the antiphon to the Magnificat at 2nd Vespers, applying the words to herself, of the union with Christ typified by the wedding feast at Cana, by the baptism of her children foreshadowed by that of Christ in the waters of the Jordan. Formerly the Epiphany was an additional day for solemn baptisms.

Joseph appears as the quiet man who is the strong and faithful guardian of first, the infant Jesus and Jesus who grows up with Mary and Joseph who lovingly care for him and ponder all that He is to be.

And Joseph, faithful who loves God and neighbour in the human summation of the Great Commandment, takes Mary as his wife and loves her and the Saviour in her womb.

This is a great feast day of the Church which rightly singles Mary, Jesus' Mother, out among all women who ever existed or will ever exist. Who is this woman whose true identity and presence is still such a cause of division between Catholics and non-Catholics?

Sadly, for them, many Christians still don't understand Out Blessed Mother even though they have a great love for sacred scripture which, as the Word of God, manifestly reveals Mary to us and to all generations as unique, sinless and the Universal Mother of us all.

WHY IS MARY UNIQUE BECAUSE, AS Fulton Sheen so succinctly put it: "You and I did not make our own mothers. But Christ did." And as God in the Flesh, God who always was "he could therefore make her the most beautiful and perfect woman who evert lived"

HOW ARE YOU PREPARING?

The Liturgical Year is a series of spiritual seasons The *Season of Advent* launches us into a new spiritual year by preparing us for a rebirth of Christ in our lives. The *Christmas Season*, which starts on Christmas Eve and ends with the Baptism of the Lord, will remind us that Jesus became one of us to show us the way to heaven.

Then a new season of "*Ordinary Time*" begins. It's not "ordinary" at all; it's "ordained" to be a season of learning, with Jesus as our teacher. *Lent* soon interrupts this for a season for examining how well we're living what Jesus teaches. This brings us to *Holy Week*, when we give to Jesus all the ways that we have rejected his teachings.

On *Easter Sunday*, we enter into a season of celebrating our victory over sin as we continue our journey of holiness. This season ends with Pentecost, when we recommit ourselves to the in-dwelling of Christ's Holy Spirit, who empowers us to learn more and live better the ways of holiness. Now the lessons of Ordinary Time resume until the end of the Liturgical Year.

Jesus gives us the fig tree as a visual aid for understanding the seasons of our faith. Fig trees produce fruit both in the spring and in autumn. Since the disciples, like other Jews, believed that the Messiah would usher in the reign of God at Passover time, Jesus used the fig tree to make a very specific point: His sacrificial death on the day after Passover would be the first harvest of the kingdom of God. Its fruit is our freedom from the deadly consequences of sin.

The second harvest is the autumn fruit. We see a wonderful image of this, its fruit is heaven. We have been resurrected into eternal life by accepting Jesus' sacrificial death for our sins.

In contrast, those who reject the sacrifice of Jesus and continue in their self-destructive sins to the very end have no eternal life in them. There is nothing to harvest.

When we're unhappy about someone else's spiritual growth, we should remember that we're all in different seasons of our souls.

What season are you in? Is it the winter of dying to self because your sins have left you cold and almost lifeless? Is your faith a seed waiting to sprout in early springtime? Are you a sapling Christian who's just beginning to gain strength? Is your relationship with Christ providing summer shade under which others find shelter? Are your branches reaching out to others? Have you begun to bear fruit by serving in ministry?

Remember the necessity of each season. Even the most dead-looking times have divine purposes.

Remember: "A Knight is a leader who stands in the breach. We defend the faith. We protect the family. And when a need arises, we rise to meet it – with charity, unity and fraternity"




Pope St. Caius the 28th




Father Christopher Bennett celebrated his 97th birthday today at Simcoe Manor.
